### 5. Welfare, Social Insurance and Social Aid

The section contains information on sources of means of subsistence in accordance with data of the All-Russia Population Census, main indicators on differentiation of women and men income, as well as data on the number of pensioners and their pensions, data of the Ministry of Health and Social Development of Russia on the number of persons living at stationary establishments for elders and invalids and homeless persons served by social aid establishments.

Information on **sources of means of subsistence** was collected during the 2002 All-Russia Population Census. Population might indicate **all kind of sources of means of subsistence** (see table 5.1, page 147).

"The income from labour activity", including private farms, (but excepting work at private household farming plots) was registered for persons who performed work for the remuneration in cash or in kind.

"Private household farming plot" was registered for persons who performed agricultural work and/or cattle breeding at own household farming plots mainly for own consumption.

"Other type of state allowances" was registered for pupils of children's houses, boarding houses, persons living at boarding houses for elders and invalids and other persons getting state allowances.


"Saving" was registered for persons for whom the sources of means of subsistence were savings, income from deposits and securities.

"Other sources of means of subsistence" were registered for persons who had some other type of sources which were not listed in Table 5.1. (for ex. beggars).

The distribution of population by sex and age and by the average per capita income characterizes the differentiation of population by the level of welfare and represents the number (or share) of women and men for each of decile groups of population ranked by the increase of the average per capita income.

For the survey on household's budgets the income represents the sum of means in cash and in kind, which were at disposal of households during the reference period to cover all expenditures (connected and not connected with consumption) and savings.

The population size with income below the minimum subsistence level is determined on the basis of the distribution of



population by the average per capita income and is the results of its comparison with the minimum subsistence level.

**Pensioners** – persons-residents of Russia who were authorized to get pensions in accordance with the legislation of the Russian Federation and interstate agreements

Average nominal monthly pensions is determined the total sum of nominal pensions divided by the total number of pensioners registered at the Pension Fund of the Russian Federation.

Stationary social establishments for service of elders and invalids (adult and children, before 1997 – boarding houses) - medical and social establishments for permanent living of elders and invalids who need care, every-day and medical service.


